2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC:

•	One of the major achievements of the IQAC has been the technological up-gradation of the central library of the College. With the introduction of the state-of-the-art RFID system the Library now has an 'open access' facility for all borrowers. •	The IQAC took the initiative for introducing Zoology Honours course. The Calcutta University has given the necessary permission and the college decided to introduce the course from the academic session beginning July 2017.
•	As part of the consultancy outreach of the IQAC its coordinator visited colleges in the districts of Murshidabad and Nadia to help them in improving their academic quality

3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- The Teachers' Council began a new initiative under its Social Outreach Committee as part of its extension activities with the focus on the academic requirements of the neighbourhood schools as well as provide support to select few organizations/institutions in the rural areas. The teachers contributed generously to the fund and a corpus has been created. The first such programme was taken up at Sarberia in collaboration with Sundarban Sramajibi Hospital. Initial contacts have been established with the neighbourhood schools and it is hoped that the benefit intended would reach the deserving students of these localities.
- The IQAC has been able motivate our students and many of them have taken initiatives to serve the larger society through various activities. Two NGOs Swapna Sandhani and Kheya have been doing social work and their activities have been greatly appreciated.
- As part of its Platinum Jubilee celebrations the college organized the Vivekananda Yuva Sanmelan in collaboration with All India Vivekananda Yuva Mahamandal in December 2016.
- Books and stationery were distributed to the needy children of the neighbourhood schools through the Brahmananda Book Bank.
- Monastic members of the college participated in value-added programmes meant especially for the youth.

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

- Placement Cell of the college has been actively training students for employment. Under its aegis coaching classes have been organized for NET/SET with nearly 200 students enrolled for these programmes. It also offers Combined Graduate level coaching for miscellaneous jobs including banking. It also runs Spoken English classes for interested students.




# 7. Innovations and Best Practices

#### • Weakness:

- The socio-economic background of many of the students(some of them are fast and second generation learners) admitted in the college is responsible for poor language competence(both in their mother tongue as well as English). This leads to an unsatisfactory level of comprehensions and communications, particularly in the fast two semesters.
- Within the existing structure the College finds it different to respond to the varied needs of its students coming from different socio economic and cultural background.
- Students coming from the under privileged section of society (all most 40% of the total strength) generally lack in nutrition that is necessary for proper growth and physical fitness. They also lack the desired level of hygiene consciousness.
- The semester system poses a number of problems which the college has not been able to come to terms with.

#### • Opportunities

- The level of academic excellence which the College has acquired makes it possible for our students to get entry into institutes of global repute. The College has to devise mechanism for translating this potential into a reality.
- The new learning of the age requires greater proficiency in soft skills among students. The College has the necessary technical and infrastructural resources to take this to higher level.
- The vision of the college makes it imperative to engage in socially relevant programmes such as organising voluntary blood donation camps, AIDS awareness programmes and disaster management skills, The College with its resources and networking can ensure students' greater participation in these activities.

#### • Challenges:

• Retaining the unique character of the College in an increasingly consumerist society poses a great challenge to the ideas the institution upholds.
