3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- The Social Outreach Committee of the Teachers' Council, with focus on the academic requirements of needy students of the neighbourhood schools undertook a planned program to provide academic support. Teams comprised of teachers and monastic members visited a number of schools and addressed students and liaised with teachers and the administration. Free tuitions in the evenings are offered at Vidyamandira, where classes are taken by serving teachers as well as alumni who are in the teaching profession. Such schools include Ghusuri Uchha Madhayamik Vidyalaya, Lalbaba High School etc. The teachers generously contribute towards funding the program.
- The Social Outreach Committee also undertook relief activities in flood-ravaged areas of Udaynarayanpur Development Block in the district of Howrah where apparel for both men and women and food packets were distributed in the month of September, 2017.
- The IQAC has been able to motivate our students, present and past, and many of them have taken initiatives to serve the larger society through various activities. Several student-based outreach organisations such as *Swapnangan, Kalyanbrata, Swamiji Work Circle* and *Kheya* have been doing commendable social work and their activities which include organised support to the disadvantaged in especially far-flung rural areas of the state such as Birbhoom, Purulia, East Medinipur etc. Their untiring efforts have been greatly appreciated.

- Books and stationery were distributed to the needy children of the neighbourhood schools through the Brahmananda Book Bank.
- Monastic members of the college regularly undertake programmes meant to inculcate values among the students. The first step of this programme begins with introducing the newly admitted students to lessons in morality and ethics to which the institution subscribes through the induction programme.

RFID technology is being used for circulation and inventory management of the library resources. RFID enabled smart cards are given to the members for using the library. Biometric System Based attendance monitoring system is being utilized. And the attendance records are tabulated on monthly basis. The annual subscriptions of two databases, i.e. Sage & INFLIBNET NLIST have been renewed to promote the use of e-resources among the students. The students are entitled to access 20 journals of SAGE both in online and offline format according to the subscription terms.

5. Student Support and Progression

5.1 Contribution of IQAC in enhancing awareness about Student Support Services

- The Placement Cell of the institution has been training students for gainful employment. Under its aegis coaching classes have been organized for NET/SET with almost 150 students enrolled for these programmes.
- It also offers Combined Graduate level coaching for Bank/ Rail/ Staff selection jobs/ LIC etc. where almost 50 students are enrolled.
- The college has recently introduced coaching classes for WBCS aspirants. The total number of students enrolled for the classes is 170.
- It also runs Spoken English classes keeping in mind the importance of English in the job market.
- Under the Equal Opportunities Cell various awareness programmes have been organized by the college.
- All the students of the college were made aware of Anti-ragging regulations in the campus which has been institutionalised over the years. The students were made to fill up a declaration form to that effect.
- To cater to the requirement of the holistic development of the personality, the Student Counselling Cell organized a two day workshop titled 'How to develop Self-confidence' in July,2017 where almost 100 students participated.

- The upgradation of laboratories and development other infrastructural facilities in the science departments are a continuous process funded by DST-FIST .
- The introduction of an Honours course in Zoology in the session 2017-18 has been possible due to the upgradation lab.
- The Library is fully automated. KOHA library management software is being used for maintaining library services. Databases of books & members have been created and are updated on regular basis. Facilities for searching Databases & Internet are also available to all users in the ground floor of the library. The Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is available online & accessible worldwide through the official website of the college. RFID technology is being used for circulation and inventory management of the library resources. RFID enabled smart cards are given to the members for using the library. Biometric System Based attendance monitoring system is being utilized. And the attendance records are tabulated on monthly basis. The annual subscriptions of two databases, i.e. Sage & INFLIBNET NLIST have been renewed to promote the use of e-resources among the students. The students are entitled to access 20 journals of SAGE both in online and offline format according to the subscription terms.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- Ragging-free academic environment is ensured.

- Special emphasis on skill development both hard and soft.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

- The college does not have the appointing authority for sanctioned posts. They are appointed on the recommendation of the West Bengal College Service Commission.
- The management on the recommendation of a properly constituted interview board selects part-time [Govt.] and contractual whole-time teachers.
- Monastic Faculty members are appointed by the Governing Body of the college on the basis of their academic background.
- Visiting faculty members are selected on the recommendation of the department concerned.
- Non-teaching staff members are selected as per the regulations framed by the state Government.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

- The college has regular interface with industry to facilitate students' exposure to latest industrial and technological developments. This enhances employment opportunities for students.
- Industrial Chemistry Department has offered its instrumentation facilities and human resources to various industrial units such as Tatas and institutions such as IITs.

• STRENGTH:

- The College is based on a unique philosophy of education which combines the material with the spiritual and offers students the ambience to develop themselves as fully integrated individuals.
- The College is fully residential in nature as it tries to work under the traditional *Gurukula* system.
- The College strives and has been successful to an appreciable degree in upholding academic discipline. The Academic Calendar has remained unaffected from disruptions/disturbances that institutions of higher learning often experience in India.
- The College has a dedicated faculty, highly efficient support staff and a team of monastic members who are available on the campus round the clock and take care of all aspects of the campus, the academic and the personal. It may be mentioned in this connection that the monastic members of the College do not accept any monetary benefit that are available from the Government.
- The performance of the students of the College in the national level competitive and entrance examinations like, IIT-JAM, JEST, NET, SET, GATE etc has been excellent.
- The College has an active alumni association which works in close cooperation with the College Administration. It offers scholarships to the existing as well as passed out students. It also offers medical help to the existing students and needy people belonging to the neighborhood.
- The NSS and NCC wings of the college have been very active and have participated with great enthusiasm in activities like blood donation, first aid training, health awareness survey, etc.
- The interactive sessions and multi-tier feedback-mechanism for securing opinions, suggestions and advice from students, parents, teachers, administrative staff, alumni, monastic members and so on have been somewhat institutionalized through such forums as Induction Session, Open House, Mentor-Mentee System, Faculty Orientation Programme, Guardians' Meet, Alumni Reunion etc. This nurtures a desirable ambience marked by openness and respect for each other which is at the core of and in keeping with the principles of good governance.

• Weakness:

- The socio-economic background of many of the students (some of them are first and second generation learners) admitted in the college is responsible for poor language competence (both in their mother tongue as well as English). This leads to an unsatisfactory level of comprehensions and communications, particularly in the first two semesters.
- Students coming from the under-privileged section of society (almost 40% of the total strength) generally lack in nutrition that is necessary for proper growth and physical fitness.
- The recruitment of faculty and staff is dependent upon governmental agencies, and vacancies remain unfilled for years on end. This results in making *adhoc* arrangements which often prove to be below the desirable standards that the Institution seeks to achieve.

• Opportunities

- Vidyamandira is based upon shared values amongst its members that bind all as in a *parivar*. This fosters a spirit of brotherhood that provides the much needed forum for an integrated, meaningful approach to rise above narrowness and selfish, vested interests.
- The level of academic excellence which the College has acquired makes it possible for our students to get entry into institutes of global repute. The College has to devise mechanism for translating this potential into a reality.
- The new learning of the age requires greater proficiency in soft skills among students. The College has the necessary technical and infrastructural resources to take this to higher level.
- The vision of the college makes it imperative to engage in socially relevant programmes such as organising voluntary blood donation camps, AIDS awareness programmes and disaster management skills, The College with its resources and networking can ensure students' greater participation in these activities.
- The Outreach and extension activities organised by the College, the Teachers' Council, the Alumni Association as also initiatives by students, both present and former contribute to address the woes of the disadvantaged and needy in far-flung areas on a regular basis.

• Challenges:

• Retaining the unique character of the College in an increasingly consumerist society poses a great challenge to the ideas the institution upholds.
