	All great film-makers have fashioned classics out of other people's stories. <i>Apur Sangsar</i> thus grew out of situations conceived by the author himself. I, as the interpreter through the film medium, exercised my right to select, modify and arrange. This is a right which every film-maker, who aspires to more than doing a commercial chore – to artistic endeavour, in fact – possesses.	
	He may borrow his material, but he must colour it with his own experience of the medium. Then, and only then will the completed film be his own, as unmistakably as Kalidasa's <i>Shakuntala</i> is Kalidasa's and not Vyas's.
